ALL FOR YOUR DELIGHT

We are sometimes asked whether, in choosing the plays we include in our programme, we take quality into account or simply box-office appeal. Indeed, this is one of the most difficult problems we have to face and our policy in this matter is governed by our conviction that the main function of a theatre such as ours is to entertain our patrons. We are told too, on occasions, that we should put on more "good" plays by which it is generally meant more serious ones. But there are good plays of serious intent and bad ones just as there are good farces and bad ones, good thrillers and bad ones and each has to be judged as an example of it's own class. To present a different play each week that will satisfy the widely varying tastes of all our audiences would be an impossible task and we can only aim to please the majority. There are many plays which we would like to do and which we feel sure that you would like to see but, which for financial or practical reasons are not possible in this theatre. Our only guide to the likes and dislikes of our audiences are the returns from the box-office. We know from experience that Agatha Christie, for example, will always draw full houses whilst other plays which appear to have equal artistic merit will have the opposite effect; and, after all, we have to live!

From primitive times the main form of entertainment has been the telling of stories and we, ourselves, from our nursery days onwards have always enjoyed a good story whether in a book or in a play and found it the surest way of forgetting, for a while, the worries and troubles of our everyday lives.

It was once generally accepted that a good play had a good story with a beginning and an end. If a romantic comedy, then the Prince finished up by marrying the Princess or Cinderella; or, if a thriller, then we learned in the first act that the Duchess had been murdered and at the final curtain we found out who has committed the dastardly deed. We have a shrewed idea that to some extent the majority of our audiences share this view. So many plays today seem to have no beginning, no end and very little in the way of a story to tell. For the next few weeks a considerable section of our audiences will be visitors on holiday in Folkestone seeking relaxation from the duties and worries of their everyday lives and we trust that you will feel that our programme of plays for the holiday season will help them to do just that.
