Across the Footlights

It has been suggested to me that, as a result of rising costs and tighter purse strings, there will come a time when the professional theatre can no longer pay its way in the provincial towns and I must confess that I was a little taken aback when the gentleman who made this statement added: "Well, would it matter?"

I should like to attempt to answer this question and I hope I can do so without seeming to take myself or the theatre too seriously—but if you dedicate your life to a job, it seems to me that you must take it seriously and be ready to face up to the problems involved as well as derive pleasure and satisfaction from whatever achievement it provides.

Above all the other arts, the drama adds to life by giving a man, as it were, a greater experience of things—it enables us to live through the fantastic possibilities of farce, or the agony of tragedy. It encourages the fastidious to know vulgarity and the vulgar to admire grace. The theatre, in short, widens our knowledge of good and evil and promotes an imaginative sympathy which must ultimately have an effect on generosity of opinion or even charity of judgment.

Films and television have their own kind of incomparable realism but lack the great advantage of bringing experience to us through human beings who are there on the stage acting for our benefit—at us and for us. They can never achieve the special emotional relationship between the actors and their audience in the theatre.

We ask for your money at the box-office so that we can offer you entertainment and relaxation—and these alone make the living theatre worthwhile. But, in my opinion, it is the ability to widen our understanding and sharpen our perception that gives the theatre its supreme importance and would make its absence from any such town as ours a matter of deep concern.
